SIXTH FORM DRESS CODE 2023-24

Presentation

The school has a dress code to promote community cohesion, smart presentation and consistency.

All our Sixth Form students are role models for the junior pupils and so must present themselves in a smart, tidy, clean and professional manner. They must abide by the school's expectations regarding dress.

- 1. Hair must be neat, a natural colour and neither overly long nor overly short.
- 2. Boys must be clean-shaven.
- 3. Girls may wear modest make up.
- 4. Girls may wear one small, simple earring in each ear.
- 5. Students are allowed small and modest jewellery.
- Nose piercings must not be noticeable. Students must remove any nose piercing when instructed to do so by staff. If a recent piercing is yet to heal, a plaster will be required to cover a noticeable stud, or the stud removed.
- 7. Skirts must be approximately knee length otherwise the student may be required to wear trousers.
- 8. Trousers must be mid-calf to full length and tailored.
- 9. Tattoos or other forms of body art must not be visible.
- 10. V neck jumpers only may be worn over a shirt and under a jacket.

All our Sixth Form students will wear their jackets when moving around our campus.

Coats should reflect the professional appearance expected of students and must be worn over a suit jacket. Students who will not abide by the expectations regarding dress and appearance can be sent home until the issue is resolved.

Parents may request that aspects of the dress code are adjusted on religious grounds for their son/daughter.

Sixth Form Girls' Suits

Jackets must either be of the same material as trousers/skirt or of a suitable, contrasting and professional looking fabric.

- 1. Suits / ensembles should be dark in either plain, pin stripe or check fabric.
- 2. A smart shirt or blouse must be worn with the suit.
- 3. Shoes should be smart, formal, closed toe, with a modest heel at most, and clean.

Sixth Form Boys' Suits

In the Sixth Form our students are expected to wear a classic, professional looking suit comprising jacket with matching trousers.

- 1. Jackets must be of the same material and colour as trousers.
- 2. Suits should be dark in either plain, pinstripe or check fabric.
- 3. A smart shirt and tie must be worn with the suit.
- 4. Shoes should be smart, formal and clean.





SCHOOL ATTENDANCE, YOUR TUTOR AND REGISTRATION.

- 1. School attendance is compulsory Monday to Friday from 08:30 to 16:00, on Saturday morning according to each student's timetable, and on Saturday afternoons when selected to represent the school in a sporting fixture or other commitment.
- 2. Students who arrive late must register at the Main Reception or in the Wortley Sixth Form Centre.
- 3. The Tutor is a vital part of the support network for students and daily contact is expected. From Monday to Friday, all students should arrive at school ready to register with their allocated tutor at 08:30.
- 4. Students may leave campus during lunch between 12:45 and 13:45. All students must register back into school for the afternoon at 13:55.
- 5. On Saturdays, students must register into each lesson and present themselves at the appropriate time for cocurricular activities.
- 6. Students do not have to attend school on a Saturday morning if they have no timetabled lessons or other commitments. Students are encouraged to come into school on Saturday mornings to make use of the learning resources.

STUDENT ABSENCE FROM SCHOOL

- If a student is absent from school, School Reception must be contacted before 09:15. Parents should telephone: 0115 849 4949 or email: absence@ trentcollege.net to authorise this absence.
- 2. Absence due to any reason other than illness will require Leave of Absence (LOA) to be granted one week in advance by the Head of Sixth Form, Paul Mayfield. Parents/Guardians should email: **paul.mayfield@trentcollege.net.**
- 3. LOA must be sought for students missing all sporting commitments and all weekend commitments.

CALENDAR AND COMMUNICATIONS

A diary of events is published in advance of the term on the school's website and the Parent Portal.

Significant events are also communicated by weekly Parentmail. This can be accessed through Parent Portal, through the Internet and the Parent App.

Term dates for the coming academic years are available on the Trent College website within the parent section (and can be found at the end of this document). Term dates should be recorded, and all steps taken to avoid clashes that could lead to a student being absent during term-time.

ACADEMIC MATTERS- REACHING YOUR POTENTIAL

Academic Lessons

- 1. Your timetabled academic lessons are compulsory and take priority over all other commitments. You will be registered into each lesson.
- 2. All students should bring pens, pencils, a ruler and an eraser to lessons. Highlighters are often useful too.
- 3. Calculators are required for many subjects. We recommend the Casio Fx-991EX (Classwiz).
- 4. LOA must be requested in advance before you miss any academic or other timetabled lessons.
- 5. Your teaching staff should be informed in advance by you of any absences.
- 6. You are responsible for ensuring you catch up with any work missed as a result of absences.

Independent study time - make positive choices

- 1. You are expected to spend two hours per subject per week in Independent Study, in addition to your lessons.
- 2. You should use this time to stay organised, to extend your reading and to meet deadlines set.
- 3. Study periods are compulsory. Students must sign into Wortley Resource Centre.
- 4. Students may not leave school during the day without LOA (except lunchtimes if they intend to return).

Examinations

As well as regular class assessments your learning will be examined four times throughout the Sixth Form. You are expected to prepare thoroughly for these tests. In previous years, Year 12 have sat examinations in November and May whilst Year 13 have sat them in January prior to the final summer exams.

Access to the IT Network and Policy Expectations.

Students may bring their own devices to access our network or can use the PCs and laptops around school. All our computers work on Microsoft Windows-based platforms. Please note:

- 1. All students are expected to sign up to and follow the rules in our Acceptable Use of Technology Policy.
- 2. Access to our IT Network depends on your cooperation with rules laid out in the Acceptable Use of Technology Policy.
- 3. The IT Network is provided to support your learning and work. You are expected to use this facility properly. You are not permitted to use any other students' log in details or accounts.

Use of Wortley Study Resources – make a positive choice.

- 1. Wortley has a range of working environments with different expectations in each. You are required to respect the rules and expectations in each working area.
- 2. You must respect the right of other students to work in silence where appropriate.
- 3. You have a locker in Wortley. You are responsible for keeping your belongings secure in this locker. You need to provide your own padlock for your locker.
- 4. You have café and leisure facilities in Wortley. You are responsible for using and maintaining these facilities and this environment appropriately.

Learning Support

The Learning Support Department is committed to ensuring that all students fulfil their potential but recognises that some students might, at some stage in their academic career, need support in order to achieve this. The Learning Support Department therefore offers support to any student who wishes to have advice or individual tuition in areas in which they experience difficulty. Students may refer themselves, or referrals may be made by staff or parents. The Department is led by Mrs Catherine Berry, Head of Learning Support, and students are welcome to visit or contact her via email (catherine.berry@trentcollege.net) at any time.

Coursework / Projects

- Coursework projects remain an integral part of some A Level and all BTEC courses. You are required to stay organised.
- 2. Students are expected to take every opportunity offered to them by teaching staff in terms of revising and redrafting pieces of work, where appropriate.
- 3. Students are required to meet often strict guidelines set by examination boards, which control how much outside assistance can legitimately be offered.

Students must make sure that any work referenced which is not their own, is properly attributed; many exam boards use sophisticated plagiarism detecting software and all a student's exam entries (not just in the module in question) could be affected if he or she is found guilty of plagiarism.

EPQ (Extended Project Qualifications)

The EPQ is an independently researched and executed project assessed by AQA. Done well, this project now has more than the equivalent UCAS points of half an A Level. Whether completed or not the EPQ offers all our students a formal framework for wider reading and research in a defined area of interest which can be referred to in their UCAS applications. It is our expectation that ALL Year 12 students will submit an EPQ project proposal guided by their Tutor.

Reporting

Regular reports are delivered to parents, both orally and in writing. These reports are presented in a range of formats which include grades, short comments, full reports and Tutor reports. Parents are invited to attend a Parent/Tutor meeting at the start of the academic year and a Parent/Teacher meeting following Mock examinations. All formal examination results are also sent home.

WORTLEY CENTRE

We are always looking to elevate the Sixth Form experience we provide - investing in the spaces our students use the most is one of the ways this is achieved. Students are welcome into a refurbished Wortley Centre that is designed to be both collaborative and flexible, reflecting the way students' study today. The Centre is a place for learning and recreation, where students can be independent and benefit from their own space whilst still being a part of the whole school community. Modelled on university facilities, the refurbished building fulfils all our students' needs in a contemporary setting. Fully equipped classrooms and separate study spaces, alongside a well-stocked library and resource area, provide an optimum Sixth Form learning environment. In between lessons and study time, students are able to socialise with friends in a variety of recreational areas and enjoy a selection of food and drinks in the new Ivy Café.

UCAS AND CAREERS

There is a detailed and thorough UCAS and Careers programme to support our students' preparations for life after Trent College. This programme is delivered through careers lectures, assemblies, the PSHE curriculum and via the Tutor team. Mrs Starbuck and Mr Butler lead the UCAS / Careers programme. Your Tutor will guide you through the process on a weekly basis during your Tutor sessions. The main repository for a students' reflections and achievements beyond the classroom is on an excellent web-based software called Unifrog. As such you are expected to work with your Tutor to keep your Unifrog profile regularly up-to-date on a weekly basis.







A range of Co-curricular activities are available to support the Sixth Form academic curriculum. These activities are designed to support students' academic interests as well as to provide the opportunity for all Trent College pupils to find an activity they enjoy, which will help them lead a healthy and active lifestyle. Together they support our commitment to positive physical and emotional health, and support the development of character traits and skills that are important in the modern world.

Sport in the Sixth Form @TrentSport

In the Sixth Form students are timetabled 180 minutes of sport each week. These take place every Tuesday and Thursday and attendance is compulsory.

Students selected to represent the school in sporting fixtures are expected to be available. We will endeavour to notify pupils of selection as early as possible. Parents will receive a text message at least 24 hours in advance, team sheets are also posted on the sports notice board in the Wortley and on the Trent Sport app www.trentcollegesport.net.

Students unable to attend sports sessions or fixtures should seek LOA from Mr Mayfield or the Medical Centre. LOA requests from timetabled fixtures should be made two weeks in advance through Mr Mahony and Mr Mayfield.

Our Sports - Your choices

At the start of each term, students choose the sport they will engage with for the duration of the term. Our sports are categorised as **Participation, Progression and Performance.**

You are encouraged to make positive choices that offer you the best opportunity to flourish.

Participation: Promotes a healthy and active lifestyle with a commitment to engage positively during all sports sessions.

Progression: Promotes a healthy and active lifestyle with a commitment to developing skills in our Performance sports. There may be some mid-week fixtures.

Performance: Promotes a healthy and active lifestyle with a commitment to participation in local, regional and national competitions. There will be regular weekend and midweek fixtures.

It is our expectation that those who can, will make the positive choice to join our Performance and Progression sport options. We deliver the highest levels of support through our performance programmes enabling each pupil to reach for excellence.

Drama in the Sixth Form @TrentDrama

There are ample opportunities to participate in Drama at Sixth Form. With a range of whole school plays, musicals and skills workshops on offer we aim to provide activities for all budding dramatists. There are also opportunities for pupils more interested in the tech side of productions and performances, and we rely on our senior pupils to set the gold standard for the younger members of the school community. On the academic front, Drama at A Level develops understanding of theoretical practice alongside exploring new and dynamic theatre companies. Students are also able to have private Drama lessons and take their LAMDA qualifications. As a department, we also support students in auditions for local drama organisations, as well as professional castings. We encourage those keen on Drama to be a presence around the department and join in with all this thriving department has to offer.

MORE OPPORTUNITIES / MORE CHOICE

SERVICE OPPORTUNITIES IN THE SIXTH FORM

All Year 12 students are required to commit to a weekly service activity and some of our Year 13 students will continue to do so in their final year. These opportunities take place throughout the week, providing students with a range of learning and service opportunities. The final list of opportunities will be confirmed in September, but is likely to include:

Community Leadership

- 1. The Elms / Trent Sports clubs' support
- 2. The Elms / Trent non-sports clubs' support

Charity Team

This service activity is all about supporting and promoting Trent's three named charities: Operation Orphan, Canaan Trust and our Kenya Schools Partnership. It is an ideal activity for students who above all care about working for and on behalf of those less fortunate than themselves.

Community Service

This service option includes making regular phone calls to local elderly residents and visiting local primary schools to support their activity programmes.

Debating

Pupils teach debating skills to younger pupils.

Green Gardeners

Pupils tend the school allotment, learning all about food production and donating their produce to a local food bank.

Community Knitters / Sewers

Pupils undertake a variety of knitting or sewing projects, for example making small beanie hats for premature babies.

Trent Environmental Team

This service aims promote and engage in events that support our local and wider environment.

Lifesaving

This service teaches valuable lifesaving skills and First Aid to pupils.

Peer Reading

Students meet regularly to encourage and support the development of reading skills amongst our younger students.

House Event Management

This service is for students who wish to help younger students prepare and engage in a range of inter-house competitive events.

Departmental Support

Pupils can support an academic department, for example by producing displays or revision material or running academic clubs.

CCF

Students with experience in the CCF may continue in leadership roles as Non Commissioned Officers (NCOs). This activity comes with opportunities over Field Days, national CCF camps and CCF competitions.

PREFECT AND OTHER LEADERSHIP ROLES

There are many positions of responsibility and leadership for which students can and should apply. These include a significant number of different Prefect roles as well as opportunities to lead in the CCF, Boarding Houses, Sports Teams, Debating Team and more.

In Year 13, students take over senior prefect and leadership roles.

BOARDING IN THE SIXTH FORM

Boarding in the Sixth Form is very popular with approximately 40% of our Sixth Form boarding. Students can choose to board full time, weekly or on a more flexible arrangement. Students choose to board for a number of reasons:

- 1. To make use of the varied, well-structured and supervised study sessions.
- 2. To make use of improved access to academic resources and support.
- 3. To make use of improved access to sport and leisure facilities.
- 4. To enjoy the truly wonderful sense of community amongst our boarders.

BEHAVIOUR IN THE SIXTH FORM

Our Rewards and Sanctions Policy seeks to promote high standards of behaviour by rewarding and

reinforcing positive behaviour and by encouraging pupils to take full responsibility for their actions and their consequences.

Rewards

- All students can receive Merits in line with our objectives to promote Positive Accomplishment, Positive Engagement and Positive Relations.
- 2. Students who acquire numerous Merits may be celebrated in Sixth Form Assemblies, they may receive a further Commendation for maintaining consistently high standards and their Merits will earn them access to a termly prize draw.
- 3. Excellence will be rewarded with School Colours and Prizes at the end of the year.

Sanctions

- All members of our school community should expect to teach, learn, supervise, tutor and, for boarding staff, live in a safe, positive, civilized and stimulating environment. Sixth Form students should expect to be challenged if their behaviour falls short of these expectations. A quick, mature and cooperative resolution is expected.
- 2. In the Sixth Form, students are encouraged to effectively manage their own work schedule, to meet deadlines and stay on top of their work. A Sixth Form detention is available after school from 16:15-17:15 on published days, should a student fall behind in their work or miss a deadline. The sanction is there to support a student in the completion of their work.
- 3. A full explanation for issuing a Sixth Form detention is emailed home.

Behaviour Review Meetings

Behaviour Review Meetings are held when the school has more significant concerns about the behaviour of a pupil. They are not sanctions in themselves. They are, however, a formal, high-level review of pupil conduct and are held separately to the usual pastoral discussions with parents. They may be called following an isolated, serious incident or as a result of a concerning pattern of behaviour.

A Behaviour Review Meeting is called to enable pastoral staff (normally a combination of Tutor, Head of Year, Housemaster/Mistress, Head of Tier and Deputy Head) to meet with the parents and the pupil to attempt to understand the behaviour and, in most cases, to agree the actions required to ensure improvement and guide future behaviour.

In accordance with our commitment to the role of positive dialogue in relation to behavioural change, Behaviour Review Meetings play an important role in ensuring that any punishment is accompanied by additional supportive measures whenever possible.



Feeling unwell?

- If you feel ill and unable to attend a lesson then you MUST go to the Wortley Resource Centre Manager or Main Reception for permission to attend the Medical Centre. This is to ensure the Medical Centre is staffed for your arrival.
- 2. The member of staff teaching your lesson should be informed, as should your Tutor.
- 3. On no account go home without the permission of the Medical Centre, the Head of Sixth Form or Head of Year.

Counselling

The school has two fully qualified and experienced Counsellors, Mrs Cath Parfitt and Mrs Samantha Adams, who provide support to students when needed. The care and support provided by the School Counsellors is an important aspect of our caring community. You are welcome to make an appointment to see Mrs Parfitt or Mrs Adams as appropriate by either speaking to a member of staff or contacting them directly via email.

Bullying

Bullying affects everyone, not just the bullies and their victims. It is neither an inevitable part of school life, nor a necessary part of growing up. No one person or group, whether staff or pupil, should have to accept this type of behaviour, the seriousness of which can cause considerable psychological damage and even drive individuals to suicide.

• All pupils have the right to an education free from bullying within a supportive, safe and caring environment.

• All members of staff also have the right to work in an environment free from any harassment or bullying; whether this is from staff, pupils or parents.

The school is committed to supporting everyone in our community and keeping it free from bullying.

1. Verbal bullying: This may involve name calling, may make use of written notes, e-mails, or mobile phone messages and/or may include threats of physical violence. Referring to an exchange as 'banter' is unacceptable in an attempt to excuse upset being caused to others.

2. Physical bullying: This often consists of deliberate jostling, bumping or shoving and those responsible may easily maintain that it is accidental when detected for the first time. Physical bullying may also involve theft or damage to property. Not all theft or damage is bullying, but bullying occurs where the intention is to create fear and to use power improperly.

3. Manipulative bullying: This may involve manipulating social networks (including electronic networks) with the intention of excluding, ostracising or marginalising individuals from their friends and normal relationships. Manipulative bullying may also involve the spreading of rumours, posting of electronic images without the other persons consent or malicious accusations.

4. Homophobic/Transphobic Bullying: This type of bullying may be motivated by a prejudice against lesbian, gay, transexual or bisexual people.

5. Cyberbullying: This is the use of information and communications technology, particularly mobile phones, social networking sites and the internet in general to deliberately upset.

6. Racist bullying: The definition of race includes colour, nationality and ethnic or national origins. The term racist bullying refers to a range of hurtful behaviour, both physical and psychological, that makes a person feel unwelcome, marginalised, excluded, powerless or worthless because of their colour, ethnicity, culture, faith, community, national origin or national status.

WHAT YOU SHOULD DO IF YOU ARE BEING BULLIED OR ARE CONCERNED ABOUT A FRIEND?

For Students:

Ensure that your concern is shared with a member of staff. It is helpful to write things down with as much detail as possible. Never take matters into your own hands. Sometimes, bullying happens without the intention to cause upset. The school will manage and record allegations of bullying in line with the Anti-Bullying Policy. Staff should ensure that you know what has been done in response to your concern.

For Parents:

Parents should report any anxieties they may have to the Tutor in the first instance. These would be passed on to the Head of Year, Housemaster/Mistress (for boarders) or Head of Tier, as necessary. Parents can be reassured that the school will treat their concerns seriously, and sensitively, and that they will be kept informed of any action taken.

A full copy of our Anti-Bullying Policy is available to all students on the Intranet and a hard copy is available on request.

CONCERNS OVER THE USE OF ILLEGAL DRUGS AND OTHER BANNED SUBSTANCES, SMOKING AND ALCOHOL

- 1. The Governing Body of Trent College is determined via the school's educational programme and its rules to encourage all pupils not to engage in behaviours and activities, which put their health at risk.
- 2. Trent College aims to encourage all its' pupils and students to develop healthy lifestyles. Recognising the dangers to health of smoking, the school has a no smoking and no vaping policy. Whilst at school, engaged in any school activity, on any school trip or dressed in school uniform, pupils and students are forbidden to smoke (or vape) or to have in their possession any material which is directly linked with smoking or vaping.; this includes apparatus, regardless of whether or not it contains a nicotine-based substance.
- 3. The Governing Body of Trent College is determined via the school's educational programme and its rules to encourage all pupils to develop responsible, healthy lifestyles. Following this principle, we commit to educating pupils on the dangers of excessive drinking and encouraging any senior students who are consuming alcohol to do so in moderation.
- 4. The school is also keen to make it clear that it is quite unacceptable for any pupil either to be at school showing the effects of alcohol consumption or to miss school or any school activity for the same reason.
- 5. At certain evening functions a limited quantity of wine may be served with a full sit-down meal and this can be consumed in moderation by members of the Sixth Form under the supervision of staff.
- 6. The Governing Body of Trent College is determined via the school's educational programme and its rules to make every effort that no pupil is ever involved in drug or solvent abuse whilst at school or engaged in any school activity.
- 7. It is unacceptable for any pupil either to be at school showing the effects of tobacco, drug, solvent or alcohol abuse or to miss school or any related activity for the same reason. It could be considered as serious misconduct.
- 8. If the school ever has concerns that a pupil is under the influence of drugs, the school reserves the right to demand that the individual goes (accompanied by a member of staff) immediately to the Deputy Head (Pastoral) or to a Head of Tier who may arrange, through the Medical Centre, for the individual to take a drugs test, which will be conducted by an appropriately trained member of Trent College Staff.

7. Students should read the Drugs Policy, the Anti-Smoking Policy and the Alcohol Policy published on the Intranet and available as hard copy on request.

CARS, DRIVING AND STUDENTS

- 1. Students will normally receive LOA for a driving test, which is not usually negotiable with the DVLA.
- 2. Students can request LOA for driving lessons provided there is no clash with a scheduled school commitment. Students are allowed to request LOA for theory and practical driving tests.
- 3. Students who are qualified drivers may drive to school but permission to do so must be requested from the Head of Sixth Form. Under no circumstances can students drive on campus, even with a Driving Instructor.
- 4. Under no circumstances can students park on campus.
- 5. A car is only to be driven on direct journeys between school and home – i.e. it is never to be used during any break in the school day.
- 6. Under no circumstances can a student driver carry other students without written permission from both the parents of the passenger and the driver themselves.
- 7. Cars must be driven and parked safely and courteously at all times.
