BOARDING PRINCIPLES

BOARDING AT TRENT COLLEGE IS BASED ON THE FOLLOWING PRINCIPLES:

- The development of the whole person, physically, spiritually, intellectually, morally, socially and emotionally, in an atmosphere of positive encouragement.
- Mutual respect should be observed by staff and pupils alike; together with the right of every person to be treated as an individual.
- The right of the individual to feel safe and not to suffer any form of abuse.
- An equality of opportunities.
- The right to privacy.
- Trent College is a home from home for boarders and provides supportive links between the school, the boarders and parents.

In addition to addressing physical needs and a sense of security and safety, each house seeks to contribute to its pupils' development in their sense of belonging, their self-esteem, self-respect and self-realisation.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

- Provide a range of experiences and opportunities within conditions that encourage the development of the full character.
- Develop an open and trusting ethos in which boarders are confident that they will be treated with respect as an individual.
- Provide a safe environment in which boarders can enjoy growing up.
- Enable every boarder to achieve to the best of their ability.
- Create an atmosphere in which any form of bullying would have difficulty flourishing.
- Develop a sense of responsibility for self, others and the environment.
- Develop boarders' qualities of leadership and the ability to work as part of a team and make a positive contribution.
- Encourage supportive relationships between boarders, staff and parents.



JOINING BOARDING AT TRENT COLLEGE

Most new boarders join Trent College at the start of the academic year. Occasionally, if there is space in a House, a boarder may join during term. Boarders are either full boarders, weekly boarders (who go home on a Saturday after fixtures) or, where space is available, flexi boarders (who stay with us 3-4 nights per week).

New pupils are assigned a 'buddy' to help them settle into the school routine. The buddy is there to help new boarders get to class, find their way around and understand how life at Trent works. They are looked after by the House Prefects, the Housemaster or Housemistress and the Head of House who will make sure everyone settles in and makes friends.

INDUCTION

Individual Houses run induction activities so that new students feel welcomed into their new home. This serves to ease the anxieties of moving to a new environment and enables the current boarders (and house staff) to help everyone to understand house routines and boarding life.

To help international students settle in to Trent College we also invite all our new overseas students for our Induction Programme before the start of term, where they will have time to relax, settle in, meet new students, meet staff and familiarise themselves with their surroundings. Details of the timetable will be available separately.

ENGLISH LANGUAGE

For students where English is a second language, Trent College will provide up to four EAL (English as an Additional Language) lessons per week to ensure the curriculum is accessible through its delivery in English. These lessons are included in full boarding fees and are compulsory until such time as the Deputy Head (Academic) confirms otherwise.

Lessons may be a one-to-one session or group lessons dependent on language skills. Overseas boarders will be assessed on arrival. We expect all students to speak English during school hours – other languages can be spoken outside school hours or in Boarding Houses.

PASSPORTS AND VISAS

For international students, when arriving at Trent College we will ask to see their passports (and visas where relevant) for our records. The Housemaster or Housemistress will usually store passports in the house safe.

BOARDING STAFF

Housemasters and Housemistresses are responsible for the management of each house and are resident in the house throughout the entire week. There is a Day Matron in each house who oversees the welfare of all boarders and is usually available in the house during the day. Each house has its own team of academic tutors and its own cleaners. There is always an adult presence in each house and the boarders are aware, at all times of the day, of who is responsible for them.



THINGS YOU NEED TO KNOW

THE DAILY ROUTINE

Please refer to the handbook for your specific Boarding House for details of the daily routine and bedtimes.

WEEKEND ACTIVITIES

For full boarders we have a full range of weekend activities once the school week has finished. Activities taking place on Saturday evenings and on Sundays will be displayed on the notice board in the Boarding House. Weekly and flexi boarders, as well as day students, are welcome to join any of the weekend trips (costs may be applicable). Every year our activities change in light of the feedback from our boarders of what they like best. The list below gives you an idea on the type of trips and activities we run:

MEALS

All meals are served in the Prince Obolensky Dining Hall. All Boarding Houses have a kitchen and provisions for snacks and drinks outside meal times. Boarders will also receive cakes, fruit, biscuits, bread and pasta within their house.

INTERNET AND COMPUTERS

Boarders have controlled access to ICT facilities every evening from Monday to Friday. All students have access to the school network and Internet service from their rooms and can bring laptops and tablets into the school for use in their house.

BEDDING

See the 'What to Bring' section of your Boarding House Handbook.

LAUNDRY

The school will be responsible for laundering students' clothes, including bedding (but not duvets) and no charge will be made.

CLOTHES, KIT AND EQUIPMENT AT SCHOOL

Whilst we provide space for the storage of clothing and equipment, it is not possible to make this limitless. This means we do ask boarders only to bring to school those personal possessions that are essential - *maximum of 2 large suitcases each.*

FACILITIES

We want boarders to enjoy their time at Trent, to feel supported in their studies and refreshed by their activities. We want boarders to enjoy our wonderful grounds both for relaxation, social gatherings and activities. During the week boarders have access to the swimming pool, the sports pitches, library, tennis courts, sports hall, the art department, music department and the fully equipped gymnasium at designated times. The general grounds and the Chapel are also accessible.



INSURANCE

The school can accept no responsibility for loss of items of clothing and personal belongings while at Trent College. Parents are strongly advised, therefore, to include children's possessions kept at school on their home insurance.

MONEY

Students can ask their Housemaster/mistress to look after small amounts of 'pocket money' and we would recommend only a small amount of money is needed for snacks, magazines and any additional purchases required by a student.

KEYS/SWIPE CARDS

In order to keep all boarders safe, the school has installed security doors (opened by swipe cards) across all Boarding Houses. Once issued there is a £10 replacement charge if lost. The Security Officer is in charge of overall site security.

LEAVING THE CAMPUS / STAYING AWAY OVERNIGHT

All Houses operate a signing out procedure for the safety and security of boarders. It is essential that the member of staff on duty in each house knows the whereabouts of boarders in his/her care. All visitors to the house also sign into the visitors' book. See the 'Signing Out and Permission' section of your Boarding House Handbook.

PORTABLE APPLIANCE TESTING (PAT)

This will be done within the first week of term in September. Any electrical items brought to school will need to go through this test, as part of the school's health and safety requirements. It will then be labelled with a sticker, stating when the date of the next test is due (usually a year later).

Items which are allowed:

- Radios
- Stereos
- Notebook computers and laptops
- Hairdryers / straighteners
- Mobile phone chargers
- Speakers

Items which are specifically NOT allowed:

- Electrical items with a heating element (except hairdryers/straighteners)
- Games consoles
- Irons
- Kettles/coffee makers
- Televisions/DVD players

ABSENCE FROM SCHOOL

PERMISSION TO BE AWAY FROM THE HOUSE OVERNIGHT

Requests must be made to the relevant Housemaster/mistress at least 24 hours in advance by the parent/guardian and prior to finalisation of arrangements. When contact is made the following information must be provided:

- Dates and times of absence from the House
- Reason for request
- Where the boarder will be staying
- Confirmation from the host is also required

LEAVE OF ABSENCE

If there is need to seek leave of absence from school, the procedure described below must be followed;

- The Head of Tier or Housemaster/mistress should be contacted by letter, telephone or email
- Such contact must be made *before* any arrangements are finalised
- Provision of the dates and precise timings of the proposed absence from school and a clear reason for the request.

Further detail can be found in the school policy on Leave of Absence.

GUARDIANS/WHERE TO STAY WHEN SCHOOL IS CLOSED

All pupils at Trent College whose parents reside overseas are required to have a guardian over the age of 25 years who lives in the UK. The guardian acts on behalf of the parents when they cannot be present. Some families appoint a relative or close friend as a guardian, but guardians can be arranged through professional agencies. We strongly recommend that parents only use an AEGIS accredited guardian organisation. The AEGIS web site has a list of Guardianship Agencies who offer their services. Guardians are appointed to ensure that:

1. There is a contact in the UK to whom the school may refer in the event of an emergency.
2. The pupils have a UK location where they can stay if they are not returning home during holiday periods or when the school is closed.
3. There is an address where the pupil can stay for medical or disciplinary reasons in the event that they are unable to remain on the school premises.
4. Travel arrangements to return home are made.

Guardians are welcome to attend school events, parent evenings, concerts and matches. Full details are available in the school's Guardian Charter.



EXEAT WEEKEND ARRANGEMENTS AND SCHOOL HOLIDAYS

We do close the school for three weekends each year and call these Exeat Weekends. This provides a welcome break for all pupils and staff. We know that it is not always easy for parents to arrange for their children to travel home for these weekends or to go to their guardians.

As a result of this, we make arrangements for these pupils to remain in school under the supervision of trained staff. There is a small charge for this service which needs to be booked in advance.

We do not offer accommodation during the school holidays and so parents must arrange for the pupils to travel home or to guardians at the start of each holiday.

BEHAVIOUR - REWARDS AND MISCONDUCT

Trent College is a vibrant, stimulating, positive and civilised environment in which all members of our community should feel challenged, respected and safe. Our Behaviour Management Policy seeks to shape good behaviour by effective use of education, rewards and sanctions. We also encourage students to take full responsibility for their actions and for the consequences of these. The standard of behaviour in every boarding house is extremely high and the school is committed to maintaining this.

In rare cases of misconduct, boarders are given a sanction which is relevant to the misdemeanour so they can reflect on their actions and change.

If any boarder fails to co-operate with their House staff, then the Housemaster/mistress will follow the sanction structure in consultation with their Head of Tier and the Deputy Head (Pastoral). This is uncommon and the general standard of conduct is very high.

REWARDS

Staff ensure that all aspects of positive behaviour are rewarded and the rewards are relative to the capabilities of the individual. Rewards are celebrated in Houses so a positive atmosphere and culture is established.

Kindness is a notable feature in all our Houses and something of which each House is very proud.

IN THE BOARDING HOUSES THE COMMON SANCTIONS ARE:

MISDEMEANOUR

SANCTION

Late up or late to bed

Early to bed

Anti-social behaviour (too much noise)

Carry out a community task (such as tidying up kitchen area)

Inappropriate use of mobile phones or notebook computers.

Early to bed

Leaving a mess/minor damage

Pupils in Years 7 to 11 may be House gated (not allowed to sign out of the house) or Uniform gated (not allowed to change into own clothes)





SCHOOL REPORTS

Teachers will provide a report on how students are getting on academically. On a regular basis the Housemaster and Tutor will also report on behaviour within the house and within the school. These will be sent to parents and guardians each term via the Parent Portal (paper copies are available on request); parents and guardians will also be invited to a Consultation Evening to meet staff. Reports will be in English but translation can be arranged at a small cost. Our reporting system gives details on each boarder's academic achievement and helpful next steps advice on what might lead to improvement.

STUDENT WELFARE

WELFARE SUPPORT SERVICES FOR BOARDERS

Boarders may take a personal or welfare concern to any member of staff they feel comfortable with.

MEDICAL DETAILS

The school community enjoys a very well equipped Medical Centre, staffed by two qualified registered nursing sisters. Both work closely with doctors from Overdale Medical Practice. If necessary students may be taken directly to the Overdale practice. All work very closely with students and staff alike to ensure that everyone receives any help, care and support which they may need.

Students will be offered all routine childhood immunisations as recommended by the English National Health Service (NHS) whilst at Trent College.

Travel vaccinations can be arranged by contacting the Medical Centre directly.

Physiotherapy, optician, and hospital appointments will be arranged by the Medical Centre as necessary and parents will be informed.

Following holiday/weekends, parents/students should inform the Medical Centre if there has been any change in their son or daughter's health or if any medication has been brought back into school. All medication must be taken to the Medical Centre at the earliest opportunity to be risk assessed.

Students requiring Epipens must carry one on them at all times, a second one will be held within the Medical Centre/boarding house.

Full details of the medical service available are included in the medical form which must be completed and returned prior to the arrival at school.

ONSITE MEDICAL SURGERY TIMES:

Monday - Saturday: 08:00-17:00

Outside this time and on Sundays the resident sister may be contacted by the house staff if necessary.

WHAT HAPPENS IF MY CHILD IS SICK?

Students who are unwell will be assessed and treated by the Medical Centre sister.

They may then be sent back to the House to rest under the care of the house matron or will be rested in the medical centre.

If required, an appointment with the doctor will be made.

In certain circumstances, a boarder may be required to stay overnight in the Medical Centre rather than return to the boarding house. This is likely to be the case if their condition needs monitoring through the night and/or is contagious. In such cases, the Duty Sister in the Medical Centre will ensure they are appropriately supervised throughout the night.

In the event of an emergency, we are served by two excellent hospitals, The Royal Derby and Queen's Medical Centre Nottingham. Trent College is situated 20 minutes from each.

IS THERE A DENTIST?

Pupils would normally be expected to retain their home dentist for routine (annual) treatment and check-ups, however emergency or private referrals can be made for students at one of our local private dental practices.



PUPIL VOICE

Boarders complete an annual survey which helps us to provide an excellent service. Any concerns can be shared with a member of house staff.

FOOD FEEDBACK

Our catering team visits the Boarding Houses at least once per term to seek feedback from pupils to help maintain the best menus possible.

HOUSE MEETINGS

Within each House, regular House Meetings are held to discuss issues arising within the community and plan events. Boarders play a prominent role in helping to make their House happy and high-achieving.

HEAD OF HOUSE AND HOUSE PREFECTS

The aim of the team of House Prefects, led by the Head of House, is to provide assistance to the Housemaster/mistress in overall management of the house.

General expectations of House Prefects:

- To liaise with the House Prefect Line Manager
- To provide leadership and show initiative whenever there is a need in the school
- To ensure that the House Rules are maintained by all pupils and students
- To take every reasonable measure to ensure that all pupils and students are courteous to each other and to visitors
- To lead by example in every aspect of their life
- To be excellent ambassadors when dealing with parents and visitors to the House
- To ensure that there is a high standard of welfare for all members of the House i.e. to be pro-active in dealing with fellow pupils and students
- To be vigilant of those in the community who may be vulnerable and in need of support
- To ensure the presentation of the House is always of the highest standard and alert the Housemaster/mistress or Senior Management when this aim is not being met.

FAQS

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

How many boarders do you have?

Trent College has around 100-130 boarders aged 11-18. Students board with us on a flexi, weekly or full basis.

How many overseas boarders does Trent College have?

Approximately 30 - 40

Do I need medical insurance?

The school can arrange for pupils' private medical insurance through AXA PPP Healthcare Limited. The private medical scheme premium is available on request.

Students are registered with our Medical Centre who are linked to the Overdale Medical Practice: www.overdalepractice.com

Are pupils safe at Trent College?

The campus is a safe and beautiful environment, with resident security on duty throughout the day and night. All accommodation, sports, music and teaching facilities are on one site with one main secure entrance. Access to all Boarding Houses is by swipe card only.

Where is the nearest airport, what is the transfer time by car?

East Midlands Airport is 20 minutes away. Birmingham International is 45 minutes away. Manchester International is approximately 1 hour away. Heathrow Airport is 2.5 hours away.

How far from London are you?

Trent College is approximately 100 miles from London - 1 hour 20mins by train, with a direct rail line from Long Eaton to St Pancras, London. The school is 5 miles from the historic city of Nottingham which has a wide range of entertainment, leisure and shopping.

What about transfers?

The school can provide a private taxi service, with police checked taxi drivers. An additional charge will be made for this service (approximately £35 from East Midlands Airport, £200 from London Heathrow.)

Are there any shops nearby?

A number of shops, supermarkets and restaurants are within walking distance of the school. Trent College also has a shop onsite for purchasing uniform. The larger shops are available in Derby and Nottingham city centre, easily accessible by bus.

What is included in the fees?

Accommodation and meals during term time. All standard activities (including participation in all sports, drama rehearsals & performances, music rehearsals and concerts). All academic lessons, support, tuition, examinations & examination preparation. Access to all school facilities including computer network, library, music block, sports facilities. Full laundering of clothes and bedding. All curricular trips and all standard (Saturday night and Sunday) weekend trips for boarders.

What about the food?

- Top quality nutritious food is provided in a spacious dining hall (inclusive within fees)
- Breakfast from 07:30-08:10 - full cooked breakfast, cereals, breads, juice, fruit etc.
- Lunch from 12:50-14:15 several hot options, pasta, soup, baked potato, sandwich bar, salads, fruit, variety of puddings.

- Snacks are available in Houses.
- Supper from 17:30-18:00; several hot options, salad bar, fruit, puddings.
- So that boarders can have a snack in the evening, a further delivery of fruit, bread, cake and pasta (with a pasta sauce) is made to each Boarding House.
- Sunday Service - Brunch at 12:00. Supper at 17:00.
- Tuck Shop is open during break times on school days.
- Kitchen areas are provided in all Boarding Houses so pupils can prepare their own snacks. Although they are not normally needed, there are many food outlets and supermarkets a short walk away.





What are the extra costs?

Non-curricular trips and expeditions. School uniform. Individual music lessons (one lesson per week is included in full boarding fees). Individual English language support over and above the standard four lessons per week. Occasional long range trips and expeditions outside the curriculum, such as Exeat weekend trips, Duke of Edinburgh Award training trips, overnight London theatre trips, sports tours, skiing trips and expeditions around the world.

Do we need a guardian?

All pupils whose parents reside overseas are required to have a guardian over the age of 25 years who lives in the UK. Some families appoint a relative or close friend as a guardian, but guardians can be arranged through professional agencies. The AEGIS web site has a list of Guardianship Agencies www.aegisuk.net. At Exeat weekends and during any holidays they are not going home, boarders stay with their parents, their guardian or, having received parental permission, with the parents of a friend.

How much is the uniform?

Sixth Form students wear suits; details are in the Sixth Form Handbook. Full uniform will cost approximately £400. This covers blazer, shirts, trousers/skirt, tie, shoes and sports kit. Uniform for Year 7 - 11 is available from the School Shop located on the Trent College campus.

What clothes should I bring?

On the first day in school you should have a full set of school uniform (summary sheet will be provided). You should also bring warm clothes for winter and casual clothes for spring and summer.

Who does the laundry?

Laundry is done in house by domestic staff. The students can do their own if they wish.

How many students to a room?

We offer a mixture of single or twin rooms and try to accommodate our boarders' requests. Often new boarders enjoy sharing a room for the first term or year, as this helps them settle in and make friends.

What do boarders do at weekends?

We have school on Saturday morning, with sports fixtures occupying most pupils throughout the afternoon. For full boarders, on Saturday evening we have cinema trips, theatre visits, bowling or Laserquest.

Our Sunday activities includes trips to local centres of interest, Alton Towers theme park, Nottingham, Derby and Birmingham shopping, SpringLakes AquaPark, Go-Karting.

Is Chapel compulsory?

Yes, though it is seen and presented as inclusive of all religions and faiths. Attendance is normally once per week.

What sports do you play?

Boys' major sports: Rugby, Hockey, Cricket, Tennis, Swimming. Girls' major sports: Hockey, Netball, Tennis, Swimming. Other alternative sports include: Golf, Badminton, Kayaking, Climbing, Football, Gymnastics, Basketball, Table Tennis, Mountain Biking and Chess.

Can students bring their own laptop, tablet or iPad?

Yes. All boarding students have a direct connection into the school network. The school IT Support team will configure all laptops so they can access all services on our network (including pupils' own Outlook e-mail accounts, monitored Internet access and extensive school electronic learning resources).

What are the rules on mobile phones?

Students have restricted use of their mobile phones through the school day, but may use them during other times and around their Boarding House.
